

letter from our board chair

Dear Friends of the Museum,

Fiscal Year 2024 has been an incredible story of what can happen when we dream big, strive to do things that have never been done before, and work together to build something great for our community.

In October 2023, we opened *Bloom*, a playful space for early learning. Grounded in the latest research on brain development, this space welcomes children newborn through 36 months and their caregivers to relax, connect and grow together in a whimsical, nature-inspired setting.

The Museum's newest exhibit, *Gallery Uno*, opened in June 2024, and is like nothing the Museum has attempted before. The rotating exhibits in this space center on a single word that inspires an entire installation. It is a chance for our staff to play, experiment and try new things, and we are overjoyed with the reaction the inaugural experience, *SNUG*, received.

In addition to creating inspiring new exhibits, we were thrilled to welcome 525,429 members and guests to the Museum in FY24. The Museum is committed to working toward a future where all children can experience the wonder and joy of childhood, regardless of their family's income, and in FY24, more than a quarter of our guests visited for free or at a greatly reduced cost through one of the Museum's Access Programs. These programs have become invaluable to our community and are our largest fundraising need.

Thank you for coming along with us on this journey of growth, challenge and collaboration. We could not do this important work without our incredible donors, stakeholders and friends who believe in and champion our mission.

a year in review

Access is Key

At the Museum, we believe all children and families should be able to enjoy rich, hands-on learning experiences that inspire creativity, wonder and joy. Because of our commitment to access, the Museum has several initiatives to extend free or greatly reduced admission to families who may not otherwise be able to afford a Museum visit. These include the SNAP Access Initiative, which offers greatly reduced admission to families in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, and our Sponsored Admissions and Memberships Program, which offers free programs and annual family memberships to children in qualifying Title I schools. Through these initiatives and other access and outreach programs, 25% of our audience (more than 125,000 guests!) experienced the Museum for free or at greatly reduced cost in FY24.

a playful space for early learning

On October 16, *Bloom* opened its doors for our community. This nature-inspired space nurtures the imagination with tangible and playful details. It features experiences like a whimsical fairy garden with elements of light and sound, grassy moguls, a creative climber just for littles, a peek-a-boo flowerpot with smart glass, and plenty of amenities for families of newborns and toddlers. To bring this space to the next level, original art pieces crafted by Colorado artists Betony Coons, Katelynn Mai-Fusco, Bree Angela and Anna Hultin are woven throughout the exhibit to make this a truly one-of-a-kind immersive experience.




On June 19, the Museum opened a rotating exhibit space, *Gallery Uno*. One word is chosen to define each new experience, allowing the Museum to create relevant and timely installations that evoke connection and conversation. The first installation was inspired by the word *SNUG*, and encouraged guests to squish, scramble, nestle and crawl through a floor to ceiling maze of precisely stacked couches, chairs, ottomans and cushions while uncovering suprises around every corner.

Our sensory-friendly studio, *The Nest*, received a whimsical makeover in FY24. Previously labeled a low-sensory exhibit, our team was inspired by the work of Dr. Winnie Dunn and revamped the studio to support a wide range of sensory needs. This tropical-themed space features warm, soothing colors, soft lighting and limited ambient noise, perfect for enjoying a quiet moment.

FUNdraising Events



In FY24, our fundraising events raised over \$330,000. The Museum's 50th Birthday Bash was a celebration of our vibrant history, filled with auctions, cocktails, delicious food, dancing and most importantly, great friends. Joy on Tap, our craft beer festival, had another sold out year! We hosted 20 breweries, 8 food stations and a Museum full of adult guests who enjoyed an evening of play in the Museum's world-class exhibits.

Community Events & Programs



The Museum offered more than 1,800 educational programs (all included with Museum admission!) to our members and guests in FY24. We hosted cooking classes in *The Teaching Kitchen*, where diverse foods and recipes were on the menu. Through the Artist-in-Residence Program, guests worked alongside professional artists Eileen Roscina, Jessica Garramone, Sol Aldinger and Traci Zajaczkowski to create unique pieces just for the Museum. Outside, we got guests moving, grooving and exploring nature during Joy Park Adventures. And our wildly popular community events, Harvest Hoot, Noon Year's Eve and Party for Our Planet, welcomed more than 14,500 guests in FY24.
